Scholarship assists Aleya's path to radiology

When Aleya Davis received the call letting her know she had been awarded the **Gene & Shirley Nuckolls Scholarship** from the Saginaw Community Foundation, she was on vacation – and the moment was unforgettable.

"I was so happy," she recalls. "I told my mom right away, and we went out for dinner to celebrate. The scholarship eased so much financial stress."

Aleya, a graduate of Heritage High School and the Saginaw Career Complex, is now in her final year at Delta College, studying radiology. Her passion for the field was sparked by her grandmother, who is a radiologist and one of Aleya's biggest role models.

"I've always wanted to help and inspire others the way she does for her patients every day."

Growing up in Saginaw shaped who she is today. "It's a tight-knit community – not too big, not too small. The support from Saginaw Community Foundation gives people hope, and that's something special."

Aleya found the scholarship while researching ways to reduce her student loan debt. "The application process was easy and personal," she says. "It really made a difference."

Her advice to other students:

"Don't let doubt stop you. Take the time to apply. Every dollar helps."

Saginaw Community Foundation has been helping local students achieve their educational dreams for over 38 years. Each year, more than 900 scholarship awards totaling over \$1.5 million are presented to high school seniors, current college students, and adult learners from Saginaw County, the Great Lakes Bay Region, the State of Michigan and even other parts of the United States.

Whether you're pursuing Career and Technical Education (CTE), a two-year associate's degree, or a four-year university program, there's likely a scholarship opportunity for you at SCF each year.

A single application is all it takes to potentially qualify for one or more of our 255 individual scholarship opportunities. Many of our scholarship funds produce multiple awards each year.

Inspiring the Next Generation of Innovators

SCF awards \$40,000 grant to HELP CVI's Summer of Innovation

This past summer, Saginaw high school students had the chance to look at their futures from a whole new perspective – literally. Thanks to a \$40,000 Community Improvement Initiative grant awarded annually from the Saginaw Community Foundation, HELP Community Violence Intervention (HELP CVI) launched its 2025 Summer of Innovation: STEM & Innovation Days in July at the Delta College Downtown Saginaw Center.

The two-day camp provided 50–60 students – many from underrepresented and underserved neighborhoods – with hands-on experiences in today's most exciting technology fields. From flying drones and coding apps to designing video games, participants explored how creativity, innovation, and problem-solving can shape both their futures and their community.

STEM with Purpose

HELP CVI's approach went beyond career exploration. By combining immersive STEM education with community violence prevention, the Summer of Innovation connected technology to real-world impact. Students:

- Trained to earn a recreational drone pilot's license and learned how drones can be used in public safety
- Explored app and game design as tools for crime prevention and community building
- Heard from tech professionals and entrepreneurs during career panels and live demonstrations

For Executive Director Kareem Bowen, the mission of HELP CVI is rooted in addressing violence where it happens most. "For those of you who are not aware, community violence intervention is the understanding that the communities where violence exists or permeates most are the communities most equipped to deal with it," he said. "HELP CVI is a response to the gun violence that has happened in our community."

Since its founding, HELP CVI has worked directly with youth.

"We have been able to successfully engage a number of young people who are or have been involved in violence," Bowen shared. "We target populations from the ages of 12 to about 22."

Why It Mattered

Technology was at the heart of the Summer of Innovation. Bowen noted how vital these tools are for engaging students: "We're going to engage our young people with technology – drones, coding, and programming – using it to help serve our communities. Drone technology, in particular, allows us to have a presence without being overbearing and still allow young people to be young people."

The program also encouraged participants to see their skills as pathways to careers.

"This allows us to empower them with an entrepreneurial spirit, to show them how they can create a viable business, give back continually, provide for their families, and elevate their willingness," Bowen said.

Above all, his motivation remains personal. "I'm passionate about this work because I'm passionate about our kids," Bowen added. "I believe everybody wants to have a community where they can feel safe, raise a family,

and enjoy the beautiful legacy that Saginaw provides for all of us. This project allowed us to create innovative ways to engage our young people."

The program was free to students and included meals, mentorship, and career connections with local employers. By combining cutting-edge STEM learning with a vision for safer neighborhoods, HELP CVI's Summer of Innovation helped create a pipeline of leaders ready to build brighter futures for themselves and for Saginaw and beyond.

Community Awards Presented

Saginaw Community Foundation presented four community awards at our 2025 Annual Celebration held at Saginaw Valley State University on Sept. 8.

Frank N. Andersen Spirit of Philanthropy Award

Al and Beth Thieme were named this year's recipients of the Frank N. Andersen Spirit of Philanthropy Award.

In 1994, the Frank N. Andersen Spirit of Philanthropy Award was created to honor Mr. Andersen. The award is presented annually to an individual or individuals who have a history of outstanding philanthropic leadership and have demonstrated their generosity of time, talent, and dollars. This award honors its recipient, who, like Mr. Andersen, is a philanthropist in the truest sense of the word – with a personal commitment to making a difference here in Saginaw County.

Upon learning they were the recipients of this award during the program, Beth Thieme remarked: "It was definitely a surprise."

"Al and I are very grateful to receive this award," said Beth. "We've always been passionate about the Saginaw community and the people in it. And what I've always said to our kids is that this is a community that is a powerhouse of networking. We support one another, we care for each other, and we lift each other up."

Mridha Foundation Teacher of the Year Award

Donna Schantz, a teacher from Hemlock Elementary School, received this year's Mridha Foundation Teacher of the Year Award.

"Thank you, Dr. Mridha, for this award and thank you to Mr. Synder for nominating me," said Donna Schantz. "I believe that teaching students is my calling. It's what I was meant to do. It's not a job to me. It's my life."

Founded in 2010 by Dr. Debasish Mridha, the Teacher of the Year Award was established to help teachers inspire students to reach beyond their potential. Teacher's receiving this award will be presented with a grant to be used for continuing education and professional development.

"Teachers are one of our community's greatest assets," said Dr. Mridha. "I believe in recognizing teachers who go the extra mile."

Saginaw Community Foundation Volunteer of the Year Award

Brian Keenan-Lechel was named the Saginaw Community Foundation Volunteer of the Year. Brian currently serves on the SCF Board of Directors and is a member of the Scholarship (chair), Distribution (co-chair), and Philanthropy Uncorked Fundraising Event Committees.

"I am incredibly grateful to receive this award," said Brian Keenan-Lechel. "One of the things I love best and most about Saginaw is it's the type of community that can give you everything you need if you want to get involved, if you have a silly idea or, a great community initiative, there's support here and there's opportunity here."

Established in 2024, this award is presented annually to someone who exhibits: a desire to better the community, a passion for SCF and being a strong advocate, creativity, dependability, eagerness to learn, collaboration, is selfless and humble, and possesses an energetic attitude.

Joseph W. Madison Youth Award

Lily Winslow, a recent graduate from Freeland High School, was awarded the 2025 Joseph W. Madison Youth Award at our Annual Celebration.

"It has been my motto throughout high school to live by the saying, if you have something to give, give it," said Lily Winslow. "Whether that's a moment of your time to help clean up lunch tables, pick up someone else's trash, tell someone that their hair looks beautiful today, or start a community service project if you have the time to give and the energy."

Established in 2007, the Joseph W. Madison Youth Award recognizes an area youth who has given a little more and went above and beyond to serve the community. A longtime community volunteer and champion, Joseph Madison spent countless hours giving back to help make Saginaw County a better place and remarked: "Everybody's got something to give. There are so many ways to take your skills and talents and help the community."

National recognition

SCF receives re-accreditation with National Standards for Community Foundations

Saginaw Community Foundation recently received re-accreditation with the National Standards for Community Foundations – the nation's highest standard for philanthropic excellence. Saginaw Community Foundation was first accredited in 2006 and has maintained its accreditation ever since.

"Meeting the National Standards benchmarks is a rigorous, comprehensive process," said Austin Dickson, president of the Community Foundations National Standards Board. "This accreditation is a significant accomplishment that indicates Saginaw Community Foundation demonstrates a commitment to transparency, quality, integrity and accountability as it carries out its mission."

The National Standards for Community Foundations program requires community foundations to document their policies for donor services, investments, grantmaking and administration. With over 500 community foundations accredited nationwide, the program is designed to provide quality assurance to donors, as well as to their legal and financial advisors.

This re-accreditation by the Community Foundations National Standards Board represents Saginaw Community Foundation's commitment to rigorous, sector-driven best practices that exceed federal and state requirements in demonstrating accountability and excellence to our community, policymakers, and the public. As community founda-

tions face regulation at the state and the federal level, the accreditation program provides an additional layer of rigorous and enforced accountability.

"This is critically important to our donors," said Reneé Johnston, Saginaw Community Foundation president and CEO. "When people make a charitable bequest or establish a fund, they are putting their trust in us. They are counting on us to manage the investment wisely and honor their charitable wishes. The National Standards accreditation says our house is in order."

Saginaw Community Foundation offers a range of charitable funds, allowing donors to advance a cause, support an individual organization, provide flexible support for community needs or recommend individual grants. In addition to affirming the organization's philanthropic services, the accreditation validates Saginaw Community Foundation's grantmaking practices for the nonprofit community.

"Grantmaking is a lot like investing," said Johnston. "We need to assess risks, weigh potential gains, diversify assets, monitor performance and operate fairly. With our National Standards accreditation, you can be assured that we're doing just that."

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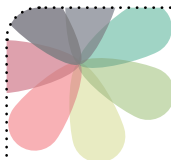
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
